The bobcat was by them.

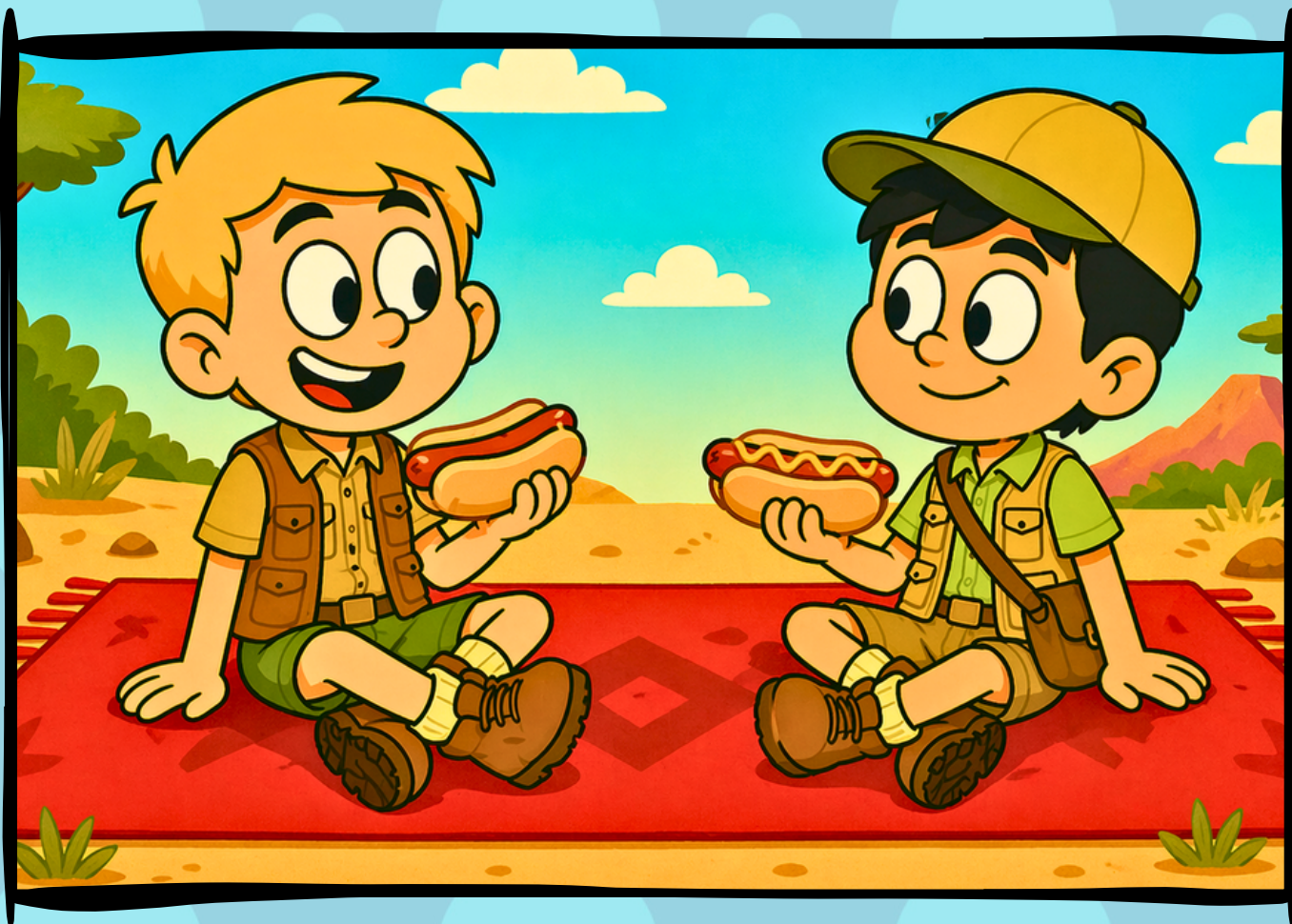
“We can not let the bobcat get the hotdogs,”

went back.

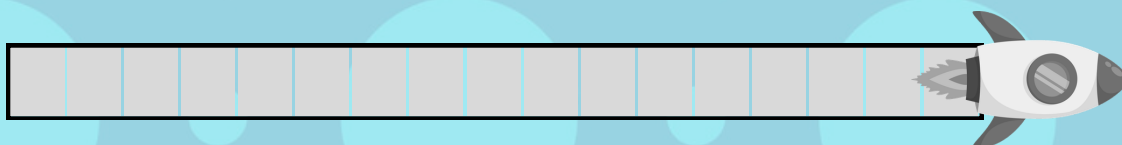


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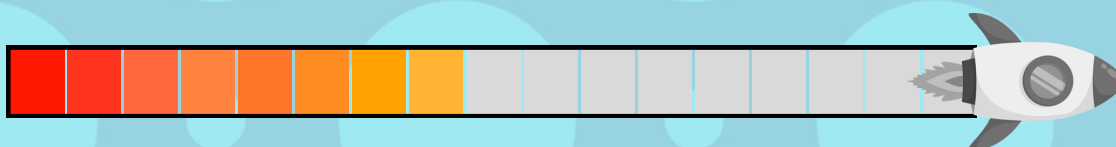


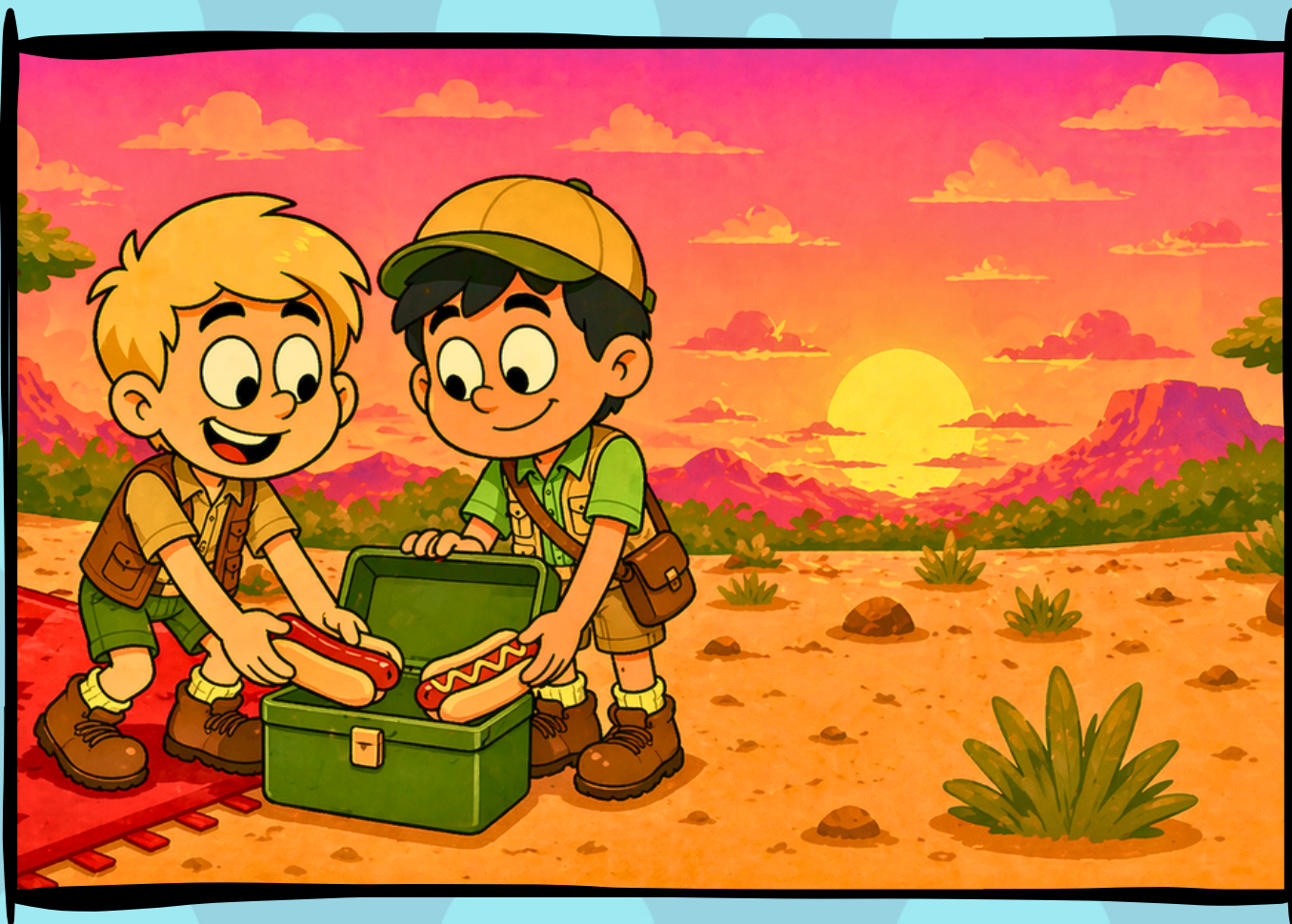
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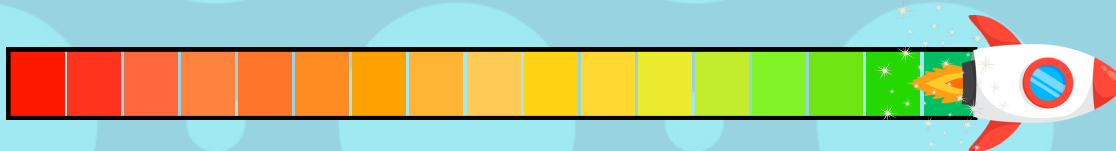
